






Resource Material 3 - Graphing page: Add tally marks or stickers so children can choose which toy they would have liked to receive.





Resource 6 - Oral Assessment for PreK/K/1 - Read the statements. Ask students to write or tell you if a statement is true.

1. Charles Page built a sand and mud city when he was 5 years old. (Yes)
2. As a boy, Charlie did very well in school and one day became a teacher. (No)
3. Charlie helped his family by working many jobs. (Yes)
4. Mr. Page decided to give 10% of his money to help others. (Yes)
